EDITOR'S VERDICT

In Beijing’s CBD, Beijing City International School offers a full IB continuum from age 3 to 18, with an extra twist that matters: IDEATE, its in-house project-based pathway running alongside the diploma years. That gives BCIS a sharper academic identity than many all-purpose international schools. This is not just an IB school with decent facilities bolted on. It has built a second track for students who want applied, interdisciplinary work without stepping outside the school. For parents weighing Beijing’s established international options, that *dual academic proposition* is the key reason BCIS belongs on a shortlist.

The school's profile is clear. It is a secular day school, founded in **1994**, teaching in English and Mandarin, and accredited by CIS, the IB and WASC. Those are concrete markers of an established international operator, not a new entrant still trying to define itself. The campus details the school chooses to foreground also tell their own story: a rooftop garden, swimming pool, week-without-walls trips, and dedicated sections for early childhood, elementary, middle and high school. That points to a school that takes the all-through model seriously and has invested in the physical infrastructure to support it. The head's message leans hard on family language, but the more useful takeaway is the school's stress on personalised learning and on recognising Chinese culture inside an international framework. In Beijing, that blend matters.

BCIS suits students who want breadth without losing coherence. The obvious fit is the internationally mobile family that wants the stability of the IB from the early years through graduation. It also suits children who are energised by projects, design thinking and real-world application rather than a diet of exams alone. The presence of IDEATE makes BCIS more attractive to students who are *restless in conventional classrooms* but still need a rigorous school with recognised accreditation and a clear university-facing structure. It also fits families who want an English-medium education with Mandarin in daily reach, and who value a school that treats Chinese culture as part of the core experience rather than decorative local colour.

The caveat is that BCIS does not publish the hard performance data that would sharpen the picture: no aggregate IB results are in the public domain in the context here, and no fee figure is available to place it precisely on Beijing's price ladder. That leaves parents to judge it on structure, programme design and institutional maturity. On those measures, BCIS stands out as an *established*, *cosmopolitan* and *thought-through* choice: strongest for students who want the IB's continuity, but do not want their final years narrowed to a single orthodox route.

ADMISSIONS

BCIS is a co-educational, not-for-profit day school in Beijing offering an IB education from toddler level through to Grade 12, so the main entry points are likely to span early years, primary and secondary, rather than a single selective intake year. Publicly available material suggests rolling interest across age groups, but the school does not publish, in the sources provided here, a detailed breakdown of age-specific admissions windows, capacity by year, or formal application deadlines.

The school's admissions pages are referenced on its website, along with an admissions policy, tuition and fees, and a scholarship programme, which indicates some form of financial support or merit funding may be available. Beyond that, BCIS does not set out in the material provided here the exact assessment format, whether interviews are required, or how places are prioritised. What is distinctive, at least from the school's own framing, is an emphasis on personalised learning, supportive teaching and an internationally minded environment that also gives explicit weight to Chinese culture and traditions.
