EDITOR'S VERDICT

Yew Wah International Education School of Beijing occupies a clear niche in the capital’s crowded international market: bilingual education with structural seriousness, not bilingualism bolted onto an English-medium school. Its defining feature is Chinese-English co-teaching in every classroom, carried from the early years through to the IB at age ****18****. That matters. Many Beijing schools promise “East meets West”; Yew Wah builds that promise into the timetable, staffing model and daily classroom experience. For families who want children to operate comfortably in both English and Mandarin, without treating Chinese as an afterthought, this is **the real attraction**. The Yizhuang location also gives it a distinct catchment: it suits internationally minded families living or working in Beijing’s southern tech corridor, not those chasing the social cachet of the embassy district.

The school’s through-train structure from age ****3**** to ****18**** is another practical strength. Parents do not need to re-enter Beijing’s competitive school market at every transition point, and children avoid the stop-start culture that can come with fragmented schooling. The IB status gives the senior school an internationally legible end point, which keeps Yew Wah in contention for mobile expatriate families and bilingual local families with global university ambitions. The pitch, though, is not to parents seeking a hyper-selective academic factory or a narrow exam-drilling environment. This is a school for families who value **cultural fluency**, **daily bilingual immersion** and **continuity with purpose** more than brute-force prestige.

Why shortlist it? Because few schools in Beijing offer this combination with such clarity: a secular day school, dual-language teaching, and a full-school pathway under one roof. That package has market value. It answers a common parental dilemma — whether to choose strong English-medium international education or sustained Chinese language development — by refusing the false choice. The result will appeal to children who are adaptable, verbally confident and comfortable moving between cultural

frames. It also suits students from internationally mobile families, bicultural households, or Chinese families who want a global education without losing linguistic depth in Mandarin. For the right child, Yew Wah offers *a rare sense of balance* and *an unusually coherent bilingual identity*.

ADMISSIONS

Yew Wah International Education School of Beijing is an IB school, so admissions are likely to be organised by year group rather than a single whole-school intake, with entry possible at several points provided places are available. The school context supplied here does not publish the precise age ranges, principal entry years or any fixed application deadlines, so parents should assume rolling admissions is possible but confirm directly with the school. As with most international schools, availability in oversubscribed year groups is likely to shape timing more than a single annual cut-off.

Publicly available information in the material provided does not set out the assessment process in detail. That means one should not assume a standardised entrance exam, interview sequence or language-screening format without checking with the admissions office. Equally, no bursary or financial-aid provision is stated in the source material supplied here, so it would be wrong to imply that assistance is available. In short, this is a case where families will need to ask very specific admissions questions rather than rely on generic chain-school assumptions.
